Easter Rising 1916

On Easter Monday, 24 April 1916, the South Dublin Union, which stood on the site of St James's Hospital, was occupied by members of the 4th Battalion of the Irish Volunteers under Commandant Éamonn Ceannt and Vice-commandant Cathal Brugha.

The Union was attached by soldiers of the 3rd Royal Irish Regiment on Monday and Tuesday and by Sherwood Foresters of the 2/7th (Robin Hood) and the 2/8th Battalions together with the soldiers of the Royal Irish Rifles on Thursday.

Despite intense fighting, the Irish Volunteers were not defeated but surrendered on Sunday, 30 April, as part of the general surrender.
