## Notes

The stained glass windows are part of the Memorial Window which was created in 1921 to commemorate those students of St. Andrew's College who were killed in the First World War.

They are the work of Alfred Ernest Child, who was Instructor in Stained Glass at the Dublin Metropolitan School of Art.

The Memorial Window was originally erected in the premises then occupied by the College at St. Stephen's Green. It was transferred to the Clyde Road location in July, 1941 and subsequently (1954) dismantled and put into storage in order to facilitate the provision of new classrooms.

In 1998 the present reception area was refurbished and the two panels of the window depicting angels welcoming the departed into heaven were incorporated into the design.

The remaining panels are still in storage and will be re-displayed in an appropriate place as the College building programme progresses.
